

## Possible Reactions To Travel Vaccines

## **General Information**

- Any vaccine can cause side effects.
- Tell your doctor if you feel dizzy, or have vision changes or ringing in the ears after getting the shot.
- Most side effects are minor, such as a sore arm or low-grade fever, and go away in a

- few days. Take acetaminophen (Tylenol®) or ibuprofen (Advil® or Motrin®) for relief.
- **Call your clinic** if you have any questions or concerns.
- **Call 911** or go to an Emergency Department if you have a severe reaction. Most severe allergic reactions happen up to a few hours after vaccination.

Vaccine	Possible Mild Reaction
hepatitis A	Minor problems include:
	soreness or redness where the shot was given
	■ low-grade fever
	■ headache
	■ tiredness.
	Symptoms usually begin soon after the shot and last 1 or 2 days.
hepatitis B	Minor problems include:
	■ soreness where the shot was given
	■ temperature of 99.9 F or higher.
	Symptoms usually begin soon after the shot and last 1 or 2 days.
influenza	Adults 18 to 49 years of age:
	■ runny nose/nasal congestion
	■ sore throat
	■ cough
	■ chills
	■ tiredness/weakness
	■ headache.
Japanese encephalitis	■ pain, tenderness, redness or swelling where the shot was given
	■ headache, muscle aches

MMR (measles, mumps and rubella)	Minor problems include:	Symptoms usually begin 6 to 14 days after the shot. They occur less often after the second dose.

rabies	■ soreness, redness, swelling or itching where the shot was given

Td (tetanus, diphtheria)	■ pain, redness or swelling where the shot was given
