## **Arthrogram**

Your health care provider wants you to have an arthrogram to look at your hip, knee, shoulder or other joint.

The radiologist will inject a contrast into your joint. The contrast will help your joint be seen on the X-rays.

The procedure will take about 60 minutes.

# What To Tell Your Health Care Provider

Tell your health care provider if you:

- have had a contrast reaction
- have any allergies to latex or medicine
- are breastfeeding, pregnant or think you may be pregnant
- take a blood thinner, such as warfarin (Jantoven®)
- have diabetes. Ask for an early morning appointment and talk to your health care provider about your medicine needs.
- take any other medicines. Check with your health care provider to see if you have special medicine instructions.

#### **Before the Procedure**

■ If you had any X-rays or other imaging tests done at a different facility, please arrange to have them sent (electronically or the films) to the hospital or clinic where you are having the procedure.

If you need to cancel or reschedule, call at least 24 hours before your scheduled

- You may eat and drink as usual before the exam.
- Bring a list of your current medicines with you to the procedure. Include all prescription, over-the-counter, vitamins, herbal or natural products.
- Take any medicines you need with a small sip of water, or as directed by your health care provider.
- Please follow any instructions you received from your health care provider.

## **During the Procedure**

- You may be asked to change into a hospital gown.
- You will lie on an X-ray table.

- The radiologist will give you an injection of medicine to numb your joint.
- He or she will insert a small needle into your joint. The contrast will be injected into your joint through the needle.
- The health care provider may move your joint around to circulate the contrast.
- X-rays will be taken of your joint in different positions.

#### After the Procedure

- You may notice a tight, full feeling in your joint for a few hours. Limit your activities for the rest of the day to help prevent swelling of the joint.
- Return to your normal diet and medicines. Follow any instructions your health care provider gave you.
- If there is swelling, call your health care provider.

### Follow-up Results

- A radiologist will look at and interpret the X-rays.
- Your health care provider will receive the exam results. He or she will either talk with you about the results or mail you the results.
